

ABOUT IMPACT

IMPACT is a diverse global organization advocating for arts and culture to transform conflict and build more creative, inclusive societies.

We bring people together and raise awareness of diverse voices and contexts through events and programs. We support those delivering impactful work through capacity building, making connections, and sharing their practice and learning. We learn from existing knowledge to develop useful resources, and explore cross-cutting and systemic issues linked to past and ongoing conflicts. We collaborate with partners and networks, and reach wide audiences, to make a lasting difference to people's lives and experiences.

Registered as a not-for-profit in the US, with an international Board of Directors, IMPACT is currently receiving support from Humanity United and private donors. Past funders include the Fresh Sound Foundation, Community Arts Lab of Porticus and the Mellon Foundation.

Thanks to our international network, IMPACT has experience working with artists, peacebuilders, and communities in challenging contexts around the world. In 2024, we continued to expand our global audience through two key initiatives: the *Creating Hope Together* Virtual Event Series and the AHA! Arts for Humanity Autobiographies Project.

Creating Hope Together









WHY ARTS AND CULTURE IN CONFLICT TRANSFORMATION?

Conflict, whether geopolitical or societal, can stem from notions of place, identity, beliefs, and power imbalances. Responses to conflict are not always rational and can come from deep-rooted feelings of hatred, revenge, and superiority that can escalate and erupt over time, leading to violence and marginalisation. If addressed from a place of respect, empathy, and justice, conflict can have a generative power that leads to more inclusive and peaceful societies. Conflict transformation therefore requires a people-centered approach and cultural solutions to ensure long-lasting impact.

Conflict can take many forms and operates at various levels: from the micro / individual level, to mezzo / community level, to macro / local or national, and mega / global. On the international stage, conflict is generally addressed from a political and economic perspective, involving peace negotiations, sanctions, and sometimes military intervention. The humanitarian response from INGOs can feel exploitative and short-sighted, with people portrayed as victims in need of immediate assistance rather than people with agency and emotional needs. The effect of this top-down response and parachuting approach can lead to many citizens feeling unheard and powerless, trapped in challenging contexts with limited capacity to engage with each other in a constructive and collaborative way. They are disconnected from those who hold power and dependent on external influences to survive rather than thrive. Often, locally-led initiatives better respond to needs on the ground through a deep understanding of place and community, and a focus on long-term recovery.

At IMPACT, we know that arts and culture can offer human and creative ways of seeing and understanding conflict. Creative practice enables people to honor and remember the past, reflect on present feelings and emotions, and imagine alternative realities. Arts and culture can open spaces for dialogue and participation within communities, and can raise voices that are usually less visible. Engaging in cultural activity has the power to awaken feelings of empathy and hope, and inspire people to take action to improve livelihoods and wellbeing. Arts and culture hold an important place in conflict transformation for more just and peaceful societies through creativity and human connection.

CREATING HOPE TOGETHER VIRTUAL SERIES



Creating Hope Together - a dynamic virtual event series, brings together artists, cultural practitioners, peacebuilders, and community organizers from across the globe to explore how creative practices can generate hope, solidarity, and systemic change in times of uncertainty and upheaval. Rooted in the belief that the arts hold unique power to foster dialogue, resilience, and collective healing, the series invites participants into thoughtful conversations, participatory workshops, and embodied reflection.

Spanning multiple sessions over the year, the series highlights stories of courage and connection from diverse contexts—featuring practitioners working in conflict zones, post-authoritarian societies, diasporic communities, and movements for justice. *Creating Hope Together* offers a space where deep listening and creative exchange become acts of resistance and renewal. This series is not just about learning from others—it's about imagining and building new ways of being together.

CREATING HOPE TOGETHER INAUGURAL EVENT



January 19, 2024



Amid global upheaval, IMPACT launched with *inaugural virtual gathering Creating Hope Together* featuring renowned peacebuilder John Paul Lederach and 38 speakers from 24 countries engaged nearly 200 artists, thinkers, and changemakers from 55 countries, exploring how arts and culture can drive systemic change, foster trust, and confront injustice.

The online event provided a space to connect, share, learn, and find hope and creative inspiration together.

Thin a time of global crisis, artists and cultural workers from Ukraine, South Sudan, Israel, Lebanon, and the South Caucasus came together in a powerful virtual forum to explore the role of art in navigating turmoil. CREATING HOPE TOGETHER ARTS FOR INCLUSIVE DEMOCRACY





The "Arts for Inclusive Democracy" event highlighted the interconnectedness of global authoritarian trends and the critical role of artists and cultural workers in building resilient communities. Through insightful presentations by speakers from Argentina, Kenya, Iran, Serbia, Turkey, Philippines, and the United States, and dynamic discussions, participants shared experiences and strategies to counter authoritarianism and promote inclusive democracies. The event underscored the importance of learning from diverse global experiences and the unique contributions of arts and cultural work in fostering community resilience and dialogue.

This was an introductory session. Now that we see how authoritarianism forms and legitimizes itself across countries, we can build future sessions around specific questions to learn from each other in more depth.

CREATING HOPE TOGETHER - PROLOGUE TO ARTS AND HR FESTIVAL



December 10, 2024



IMPACT partners with <u>DAH Theater</u> on their Prologue to Arts and Human Rights Festival "Thinking Peace", marking International Human Rights Day!

The event featured screenings of two poignant short films—*Gaza Monologues* by Iman Aoun (Palestine) and *Jogging* by Hanane Hajj Ali (Lebanon)—before opening into a rich conversation with the aclaimed artists, moderated by Dijana Milošević and Jadranka Anđelić of DAH Teatar.

Through their stories, the discussion explored the intersections of art, resistance, and the role of women in confronting crisis and oppression, highlighting performance as a force for truth-telling, solidarity, and social change.

AHA! STORIES ARTS FOR HUMANITY AUTOBIOGRAPHIES

In October, IMPACT launched the AHA! Project, unpacking the stories and AHA! moments of IMPACT community. Through personal stories, members of the IMPACT community recount their journeys connecting arts and culture to conflict transformation, in diverse contexts around the world.

AHA! STORIES



"My name is Dessa Quesada Palm from Dumaguete, Philippines. I've been involved in theatre since I was 13. I now mentor with YATTA, teach at Silliman University's College of Performing and Visual Arts, and advocate for peace and social transformation."

DESSA'S FULL STORY

"I still remember my first protest in high school-against a law that would privatize education. When police violently broke up the rally, we scattered in fear, shaken by the brutality. Then someone began singing a beloved protest song, and slowly, we all joined in. That moment showed me the power of the arts to lift spirits, awaken stubborn hope, and affirm our shared humanity-even in the darkest times."

"This might date me, but in the '70s and '80s, I was deeply influenced by thinkers like Paulo Freire and Augusto Boal. Boal's Theatre of the Oppressed broke the boundary between artist and audience, showing how theatre could be a platform for dialogue and a rehearsal for change—an idea that gave me a powerful sense of creative agency."



"I'm Armine Avetisyan, IMPACT's programme manager, originally from Gyumri, Armenia, with roots in Kars, across the closed border in Turkey. My family's stories of genocide, denial, and displacement have deeply shaped my sense of identity and purpose."

ARMINE'S FULL STORY



"One project, Haven't We Shared Much Salt and Bread?, brought together women from both sides of often. It shows how creativity is the border in a shared kitchen. They central to peacebuilding, rooted in navigated painful histories and deep divides with remarkable grace and recognizing our deep and kindness. Watching them work together was a powerful learning experience for me."

"John Paul Lederach's The Moral Imagination is a book I return to risk-taking, embracing complexity, interdependence. It's a powerful reminder that lasting change begins with imagination and a shared sense of humanity."

AHA! STORIES



"My name is Bonface Beti, and I'm a Kenyan artist-peacebuilder. I use theatre as a language for peacebuilding with grassroots communities in Nairobi, across Africa, and beyond. My work draws on participatory methodsespecially improvisational theatre, Theatre of the Oppressed, and indigenous African storytelling."

BONFACE'S FULL STORY

"I was recently invited to run a Theatre of the Oppressed workshop with about 15 young people, using games to explore conflict in their community. By the end of the week, they created and performed a scripted play in Sheng-a slang mix of Kiswahili and English often used as a language of resistance. The play surfaced themes like unemployment, gang violence, and poverty."

"I believe the best way to address the roots of conflict is by truly understanding identity. Issues like historical trauma involve fear, suspicion, and perception—deeply emotional experiences that can't be resolved through rational processes alone. While tools like mediation and dialogue are vital, the arts offer a humanistic approach that speaks to the emotional and relational dimensions of conflict, which are just as critical."



"My name is Seba Kourani, and I'm half-Syrian, half-Lebanese, currently living in Istanbul but born and raised in Beirut. I'm a theatre-maker, performer, and puppeteer who uses theatre as a tool for mediation and social transformation, especially with young people."

SEBA'S FULL STORY



"The first project I worked on taught "When the invasion of Lebanon" me a lot the hard way. It explored the duality of sound—its presence and absence-while bringing together 12 young people from Shatila of diverse nationalities and backgrounds. On the first day, they split into small groups, and I was terrified. But by the end, they were mingling, connecting, and breaking barriers in ways I never imagined."

began, I was in Mardin, Turkey, directing at the Flying Carpet Festival. I felt homesick and worried for my family, but also deeply held by a new kind of family. In that moment, I experienced the magic of art-its power to create connection, love, and safety, even in times of crisis."

AHA! STORIES



"My name is Iman, and I've been a theatre-maker since 1984, mainly as an actress. In 1991, I co-founded ASHTAR Theatre and over time, I grew into directing and playwriting. Now as executive director, I help run our small, independent, nonprofit company—driven by passion, urgency, and a deep sense of responsibility to our society."

IMAN'S FULL STORY

"Since 1948, movement across
Palestine has been restricted,
making connection—and
performance work—difficult. A
planned program in the Jordan
Valley had to be moved to Ramallah
after years of blocked access. The
daily oppression fuels deep
frustration, often misread as
violence. Through Theatre of the
Oppressed, we focus on root
causes, using theatre to express,
confront, and begin to heal."

"We presented the *Gaza*Monologues at the UN General
Assembly, and for a moment, it felt
like we'd reached the top. But when
war returned to Gaza just two years
later—and again after that—I
realized how naïve I'd been to
believe politicians truly cared. They
cried, clapped, and hugged us, but
in the end, it was just another
performance."



"I'm Emile Saba, artistic director at ASHTAR Theatre. I began as a student and returned after my master's to continue the work. In Ramallah, I've seen how theatre offers youth a safe space for expression. Through Theatre of the Oppressed, we engage diverse communities in addressing sociopolitical issues."

"Ashtar offers a rare safe space where young people from across Palestine can express themselves freely, despite daily danger and instability. During our 30-day summer camp, we saw real transformation in our students. Theatre is our resistance—we exist because we make theatre, and we make theatre because we exist."

"The Gaza Monologues had a big impact on me—I performed in them and felt a deep sense of responsibility. I saw international audiences connect emotionally and begin to see us as human. Even now, in such difficult times, people still come to the theatre. That gives me life. As Palestinians, we love life and resist through many forms—one of them is simply gathering to watch a play during war."

OUTREACH

In 2024, IMPACT strengthened its connection with a global community of artists, peacebuilders, and cultural practitioners. Through our newsletter reaching over 1,400 subscribers, we shared stories of creativity and resilience across borders. Our social media presence on Facebook, Instagram, LinkedIn, and YouTube expanded our audience with a combined over 15,000 impressions and interactions, while video content on YouTube drew 1.1K views and 42 hours of watch time, sparking meaningful engagement around arts-based peacebuilding.

Rather than focusing solely on volume, our strategy emphasized quality connections—nurturing a network of individuals and organizations committed to collaborative social change.


